THE ROLE OF CITIZENS IN STRENGTHENING DEMOCRACY AND GOOD GOVERNANCE

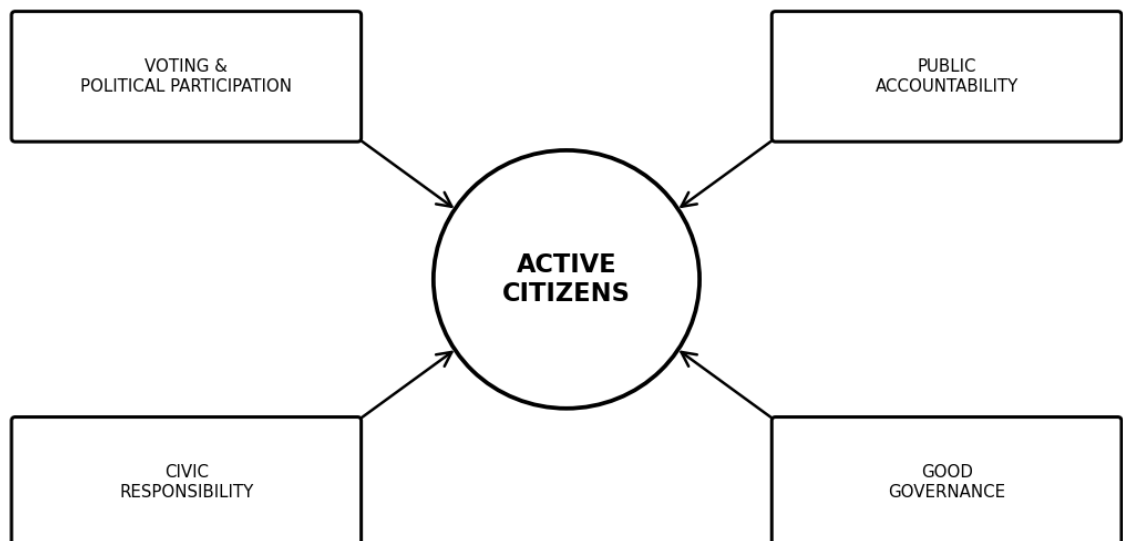


Figure 1. Simplified overview of the role of citizens in strengthening democracy and good governance.
