

The Council of Ministers and Executive Governance in India

The diagram below summarizes the major dimensions through which the Council of Ministers contributes to executive governance in India.

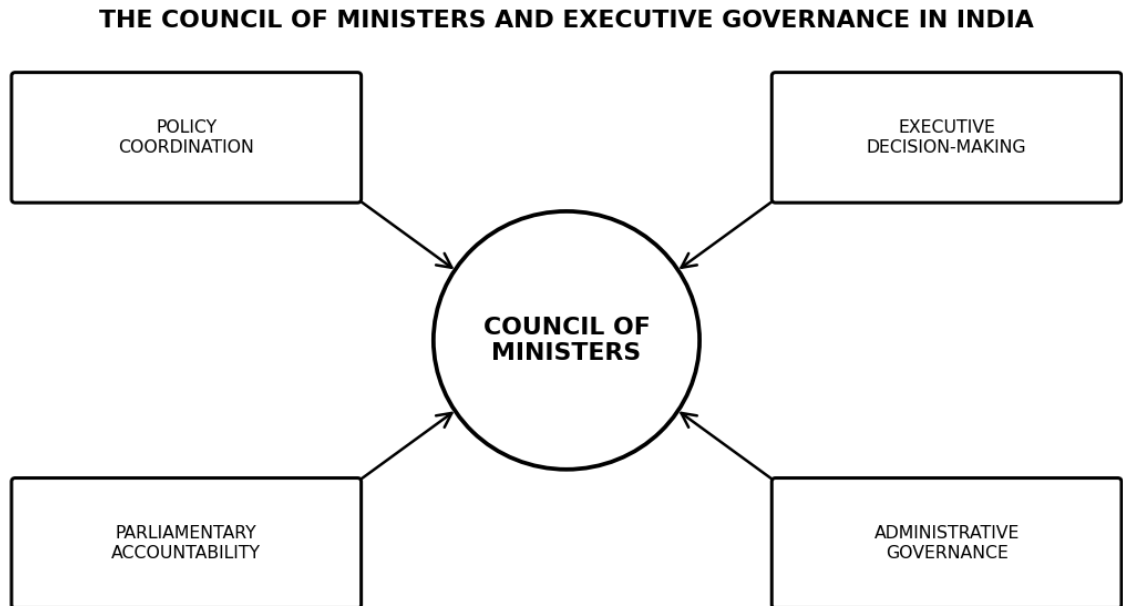


Figure 1. Simplified overview of the Council of Ministers and executive governance in India.
