The diagram below summarizes four major functions through which Parliament contributes to democratic governance.

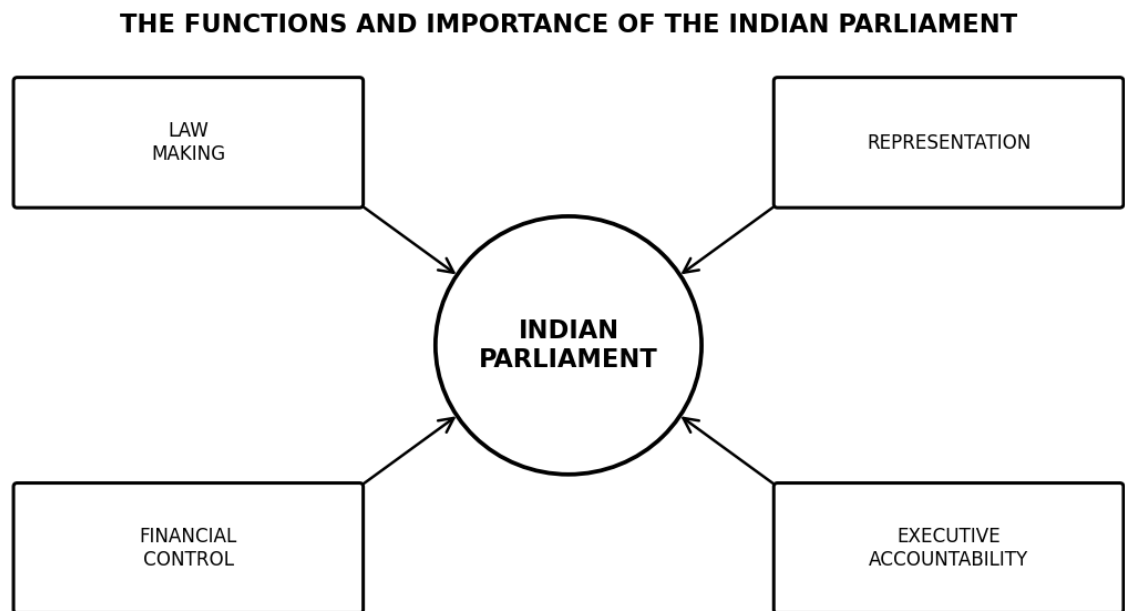


Figure 1. Simplified overview of the functions and importance of the Indian Parliament.
